1. CALL TO ORDER/PLEDGE TO FLAG/INTRODUCTIONS

Bill Jonson, Chair, called the meeting to order at 7:00 pm. and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited. Attendees in the room introduced themselves.

2. PUBLIC COMMENTS

Lenny Guzkenheimer shared that he would like to speak with staff regarding the 49th Street Safe Streets for All and the 34th Street lane elimination open house event that took place in St. Pete Beach with Representative Linda Chaney.

3. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The summary of the February 22, 2024, meeting was approved with no changes.

4. FORWARD PINELLAS ACTIONS

Rob Feigel, Forward Pinellas staff, reviewed the highlights of the Forward Pinellas Board meeting for March 13, 2024. The Board approved the draft Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP). Staff also provided the Board with an update on the Housing Action Plan. Whit Blanton met FDOT to discuss the Gulf to Bay and Belcher Road intersection study to investigate the traffic bottleneck. Pinellas County has asked FDOT to complete a Project Development Environment study (PD&E) of the intersection and Forward Pinellas has asked FDOT to consider the entire corridor as a whole as opposed to just the one intersection. On a regional note, the TMA leadership group discussed the governing board structure for a potential regional MPO and found consensus regarding the role of regional transportation operators. The TMA also unanimously approved a statement to encourage Brightline to build a new segment from Orlando to Tampa as well as the expansion of Amtrak in the Interstate 4 corridor. The Forward Pinellas Board endorsed the statement which will be shared with other MPOs in the I-4 corridor.

5. FY 2023/24 – FY 2027/28 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP)

Chelsea Favero, Forward Pinellas staff shared that every two years the funds remaining in the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP), can be de-obligated so that the funds become available in the year one of the next UPWP (July 1, 2024 – August 31, 2025). The UPWP has been amended, Federal Highway Planning (PL) funds adjusted from \$4,451,688 to \$4,171,688 and Federal Highway Planning (SU) funds adjusted from \$1,632,398 to \$1,182,398 to show the updated amounts and the TIP must be modified to match. Michael Kramer made a motion for the Forward Pinellas Board to approve the TIP amendment. This was seconded by Josette Green and passed with a unanimous vote.

6. MODIFICATION TO THE 20245 LONG RANGE TRASNPORTATION PLAN

FDOT deemed the scheduled modification was no longer required and it was not presented at the meeting.

7. ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION PLAN

Kyle Simpson, Forward Pinellas staff, shared a presentation on an update to the Forward Pinellas Active Transportation Plan (ATP). The ATP outlines the active transportation projects Forward Pinellas plans to fund over the next 20 years with its flexible funding sources. Comments made at the February meeting have been incorporated into the updates and staff confirmed that Forward Pinellas will retain the original ten priority corridors that were identified from the 2020 ATP. Existing bicycle and pedestrian conditions were updated, the latest statistics regarding benefits of active transportation were incorporated, and the Equity Emphasis Areas were incorporated into the revised plan. All changes to the Best Practices, Bicycle & Pedestrian Safety Analysis, Facility Types, Analysis and Project Concept Summaries memos were outlined and reviewed. The 2024 ATP update also included minor edits to performance measures and included pilot project summaries from two demonstration projects conducted since the 2020 ATP release. Next steps include receiving feedback from the various committees and incorporating it into the memos, preparing materials to present to the Forward Pinellas Board in April and incorporating the ATP into the 2050 LRTP. Questions were taken and appropriately answered.

8. TRANSIT SYSTEM PLAN

Jared Austin, Forward Pinellas staff, shared a presentation on the Forward Pinellas Transit System Plan. The Forward Pinellas Transit System Plan is a component of the broader Advantage Pinellas 2050 Long Range Transportation Plan. The Transit System Plan utilizes the Forward Pinellas Investment corridor framework to identify corridors with the greatest potential for transit readiness based on Federal Transit Administration (FTA) established standards. The goal of this effort is to prioritize transportation investments along corridors that are most suitable for redevelopment countywide. The SunRunner and Advantage Alt 19 Corridor projects are two successful developments from this approach. Forward Pinellas is seeking to find the next two investment corridors on which to focus. Eight corridors were identified and scored looking at equity, mobility and land use. Four were identified meeting the criteria tied to FTA priorities. Adding an Economic Development scoring criteria resulted in the recommendation of the top two corridors, 4th Street (54th Avenue S to the Gateway) and US 19 South. These corridors will be included in the adoption of Advantage Pinellas this fall. Forward Pinellas will continue to work with PSTA on their Community Bus Plan to ensure alignment with our efforts. Questions were taken and appropriately answered.

9. DRAFT TRANSPORTATION PRIORITIES

Chelsea Favero, Forward Pinellas staff, shared information on the draft transportation priorities. Forward Pinellas adopts project priority lists for its Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) on an annual basis. These lists are used for the allocation of federal funding. These lists include Multimodal Transportation Priority and Transportation Alternatives (TA) Program Projects lists. The approved priority lists are used by the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) in the development of its Five-Year Work Program. Changes to the priority list were reviewed and the committee briefed that the final lists will come before them one more time before board adoption. Questions were taken and appropriately answered.

10. OTHER BUSINESS

A. Pinellas SPOTLight Emphasis Areas Update

Regarding the US19 Corridor, the committee will receive a presentation in April from FDOT on the pros and cons or tradeoffs of building a viaduct vs interchanges along US 19. Regarding the Gateway, staff is working very closely with FDOT on the next steps

which will be implementation of land use and transportation projects in the area that can help motivate redevelopment.

B. Safe Streets and Roads for All

All five projects for Dunedin, Oldsmar, Pinellas County, St. Petersburg/Gulfport and Largo are currently underway. The City of Dunedin has a project going on along the Beltrees corridor. Draft recommendations will be brought to the city in late April. Recommendations have been drafted for a section of 49th Street S in St. Petersburg and Gulfport. A public workshop will be held April 1st at 5:00pm. There is a project in Largo along Alt 19 that just kicked off. The Oldsmar project has also just kicked off. More information on both of those will be coming soon. Another 49th Street project is underway for Pinellas County, from 30th Avenue N up through Park Blvd, which is the Lealman and parts of Pinellas Park area. The community walk audit should be scheduled for late April.

F. Additional Comments

Josette Green shared that regarding I-175, the Campbell Park Neighborhood Association has taken a position to have the I-175 corridor removed and/or replaced or reimagined it, meaning in essence of what are the three options that FDOT is considering. The association is also taking a more active stand to gather up the community to educate the

community on options. There is a Facebook page called #blvdstpete and gives a clue as to what direction the association is moving in. Ms. Green handed out slips of paper with information on an upcoming meeting and invited the CAC members to attend. The meeting is to be held on April 24th, at the West Community Library, 6700 8th Ave. N. St. Petersburg. The meeting begins at 6:30 pm.

Chair Jonson shared he has been looking at roadway beautifications along SR60 in Clearwater and at the overpass at Drew Street and US19, the City of Clearwater has determined that they are a little short of cash and are down grading the landscaping for this area. Part of the reason is because the center median is different than the medians on East Bay in Largo. East Bay in Largo has regular curbs and Clearwater has flat curbs and people are driving up through the landscaping on the flat curbs. It is said that on landscaped roads, the traffic tends to be slower and safer.

Wynn Willard inquired as to the status of the PSTA follow up on the SunRunner and was informed that PSTA will be attending the May CAC meeting to provide more information.

Board Meeting Summary & Action Sheet April 10, 2024

THE PLANNING COUNCIL AND METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION FOR PINELLAS COUNTY

The Forward Pinellas Board held this public meeting in person on April 10, 2024, at 1 p.m. in the Palm Room at the Pinellas County Communications Building.

The board approved a modification to the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and amendments to the Unified Work Program (UPWP).

Chelsea Favero presented the amendments to the UPWP, a two-year plan that identifies a metropolitan planning organization's (MPO) transportation planning activities and associated funding. The amendments concern de-obligating \$730,000 in funds that the MPO anticipates not using for the remainder of the two-year period ending June 30, 2024, which would allow those funds to be available at the start of the next two-year planning period, in July 2024.

Discussion:

- Commissioner Eggers requested information on why we must de-obligate funds. Chelsea clarified that the Florida Department of Transportation needs administrative processing time.
- Commissioner Scott asked if we anticipate spending all the money during the upcoming fiscal year? Chelsea noted since the UPWP is a two-year document, and the de-obligation comes up every two years, any remaining funds for this next year will not need to be deobligated. There are plans in place that would make use of the funds.

The board approved and accepted the PPC and MPO Annual Audits for 2022-23 (FY23).

Julie Davis and Elise Leach, with Rivero, Gordimer & Company, shared the auditor's opinion that the MPO and PPC have complied in all material respects with applicable financial requirements for the year ended September 30, 2023.

Forward Pinellas staff presented the preliminary FY25 Pinellas Planning Council (PPC) Budget.

Rodney Chatman shared the preliminary budget that funds the primary responsibilities of the PPC, including the administration of the Countywide Plan, providing technical assistance to local government partners, and conducting special studies and research. The agency submitted a flat budget and associated stress tests, which would potentially reduce expenses by 3% and 5%, to the Office of

Management and Budget (OMB), as requested. Overall, the PPC's fiscal picture is good - the preliminary flat budget is balanced without using reserves, resources are available to achieve the strategic priorities of the agency, and three months of expenses are reserved for an emergency.

Discussion:

Whit Blanton highlighted the purpose of the reserves/unassigned fund balance. It
importantly serves as a working capital fund. It is helpful to have in an agency like Forward
Pinellas that seeks out significant federal funds. The reserves can be used to help meet local
match requirements, can assist in funding future MPO merger costs, etc.

The board members were provided an update on plans for US 19 North.

Brian Hunter with the Florida Department of Transportation provided the board with an overview of projects that can be considered for the US 19 North corridor, with the intent to improve highway capacity on US 19 while also providing safe accommodations for bicycle, pedestrian, and transit rider access and visibility of local businesses in the Palm Harbor and Tarpon Springs area of North Pinellas County.

Discussion:

- Commissioner Eggers noted he would be interested to hear about user experiences of the viaduct in Gandy in Tampa. He also inquired if having elevated lanes would reduce congestion. Brian said yes, as it would move traffic along quicker and relieve pressure off the at-grade level.
- Vice Mayor Gerard inquired if FDOT was leaning towards the viaduct as the solution. Brian noted there is no preference at this time as significant community input is still required.
- Whit Blanton said he would be interested in hearing from the public about how to activate the space underneath US 19 if the elevated viaduct is created.

The board was provided updates regarding the Advantage Pinellas 2050 plan.

Jared Austin provided updates on the Transit System Plan. The goal of this effort is to identify the top performing corridors, that with the right investments and strategic land-use planning, could best foster redevelopment and growth in ridership, improve transit service quality and connectivity, and benefit the overall transit network performance. This included a two-step screening process to evaluate each corridor's readiness for redevelopment and better transit service.

Discussion:

• Commissioner Scott inquired how the initial eight routes were identified. Whit said what was considered included the top performing PSTA routes in terms of ridership, but also where we can most likely link jobs, housing, and redevelopment. Commissioner Scott then

also asked for the difference between Step A and Step B in evaluations. Jared clarified that Step B includes more refined data analysis, such as access to housing, jobs, land use changes, etc.

- Whit noted that public sentiment and local government support needs to be considered in addition to these metrics.
- Commissioner Eggers asked if all categories (land use, equity, mobility) are weighted equally? Jared will follow-up with more details on the weighting scheme.
- Vice Mayor Gerard asked why Ulmerton Rd. was not included? Chelsea said some of the considerations of which corridors to include considered parcel size and land development potential. Whit noted a limitation of Ulmerton Rd. is it has a lot of single use, industrial warehouse parcels, so there is not a lot of employment density potential compared to other corridors. Ulmerton is still part of our LRTP.

Kathrin Tellez, of Fehr and Peers, provided an overview of the update to the Active Transportation Plan (ATP). The ATP identifies the vision for a highly connected and accessible trail and bicycle facility network throughout Pinellas County. The plan includes a scoring system that prioritizes and develops a cost feasible list of projects through 2050. To date, multiple corridors and overpasses have advanced to design and construction, while others have been delayed for various reasons.

Discussion:

- Commissioner Eggers drew attention to a couple maps that indicated there are more areas that are comfortable for walking than biking. Kathrin confirmed this is accurate.
- Commissioner Scott noted he disagrees with the analysis of certain sections, such as Clearwater Beach to Belleair Causeway, and asked if any of this analysis includes interviewing cyclists or pedestrians? Kathrin noted this analysis is based on the FDOT's Multimodal Analysis guidelines and so it is intended to be a generalized analysis of the county and does not factor individual experiences. She said people were not interviewed at this time since this is an update, but this can be included during the next whole refresh. Whit said we did do a recent survey with bicyclists and pedestrians about their experiences with the trail that can be integrated with this analysis.

Forward Pinellas staff presented the draft Transportation Priorities.

Chelsea Favero presented the draft Multimodal Priority List and the Transportation Alternatives (TA) Program Priority List. These lists are incorporated into the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) each year, guide decisions on using federal funding for transportation projects, and are used by FDOT to develop its Five-Year Work Program.

Discussion:

• Commissioner Eggers inquired when the Gateway Expressway will open. A representative from FDOT said it is tentatively scheduled for April 22nd, pending weather.

- Councilmember Floyd asked for the status of conversations with FDOT regarding projects with shortfalls in funding in the City of St. Petersburg, with the goal of completing projects that already have some funding before adding new projects. Chelsea confirmed there has been ongoing conversations with the city, but there have been challenges to a couple projects. Some items FDOT cannot pay for by virtue of the program, in addition to inflation costs. Forward Pinellas is looking at reshuffling projects in the later years of the Work Program to make these projects whole.
- Commissioner Eggers asked if counters are being set up in the new areas of the trail? Kyle Simpson, with Forward Pinellas, responded that Forward Pinellas has not, but FDOT just installed one just north of Chestnut Park.
- Commissioner Eggers then asked if there have been any safety issues at the flashing beacons at Sunset Point, a four-way intersection? Chelsea noted there are none that we are aware.
- Commissioner Eggers raised the point that there are inconsistencies at trail crossings across the county. Chelsea and Mayor Bujalski noted this is partially to do with working with the differing needs of local communities. Whit Blanton added that a Board of County Commissioners workshop is being planned for August in which trail issues, such as this, will be discussed.
- Councilmember Driscoll inquired if projects in St. Petersburg need modification considering an upcoming vote to alter the zoning overlay in the Warehouse Arts District? Chelsea noted the recommendations came from the city just last year but will inquire.

The 2023-2024 Forward Pinellas intern with the University of South Florida's Master of Urban and Regional Planning Fellowship provided an overview of work completed.

Alexis Hall provided an overview of the items she has worked on during her time at Forward Pinellas, including Bicycle and Pedestrian Planning Program support, Advantage Alt. 19 Implementation, Gateway Master Plan Implementation, and participation in Safe Streets and Roads for All Projects.

SPOTlight Update

Executive Director Whit Blanton provided the following updates:

- A State Rd. 60 Corridor Study is in the works between Pinellas County, FDOT, and the City of Clearwater. FDOT has identified its share of the needed funding. The City and County have been briefed and indicated interest in financially participating. The City of Clearwater was awarded a Safe Streets for All (SS4A) grant for safety improvements in this corridor in the amount of \$1 million of the \$10 million requested. Thus, there is a need to redesign that project given available funds.
- Regarding waterborne transportation
 - The St. Pete Chamber has been working with the Urban Land Institute to figure out a scope for a technical assistance panel on improving the efficiency and effectiveness

of the Cross Bay Ferry. Forward Pinellas has offered to do market research and market segmentation analysis.

- There is ongoing conversation on pulling money together for a local match for the FDOT grant awarded to PSTA for the Clearwater Ferry. The target for re-launching this regular service between Dunedin, downtown Clearwater and Clearwater Beach is in October.
- Forward Pinellas is working with the County on the new county campus on Ulmerton Road, including dialogue about how to address transportation and access issues to that site. The City of Largo will initiate amendments to its Comprehensive Plan to implement recommendations from the Target Employment and Industrial Land Study Update for that area.

Other Items

- Pinellas Suncoast Transit Authority (PSTA) Report:
 - The PSTA Board approved a Project Management/Construction Management contract to provide project management assistance for various PSTA capital projects, such as a new SunRunner station, solar panel installation, and fiber connection to PSTA.
 - The Board received a report on development that is occurring in the SunRunner corridor which has seen residential, hotel, and commercial development with a construction value of \$9.4 million.
 - Vice Mayor Albritton shared that there will be a ceremony to commemorate the closing on the land for the new Clearwater Transit Center on Monday April 15th at 10am, at the corner of Myrtle and Court St.
- Regional Activities Report:
 - TMA leadership group has discussed the governing board structure for a potential regional MPO. They found consensus regarding the role of regional transportation operators. These would be considered regional entities and, thus, should not come out of Hillsborough's voting allocation by population, so long as the representative from these regional entities is not an elected official.
 - Regarding the regional MPO formation, Chair Janet Long said the St. Pete/Clearwater Airport (PIE) should be included with regional operators. She also inquired if there is value in having someone from our St. Pete/Clearwater Airport (PIE) to come give a presentation on the airport's growth.
 - Commissioner Scott shared that PIE expecting to accommodate an increase from 2.5 million to 3.5 million passengers.
 - Commissioner Eggers noted regional operators' seats/votes would be off the top. The remaining 23 would be split between the three counties. A part of Pinellas County's allocation could come from the airport since, unlike the Tampa International Airport and Port of Tampa Bay, the PIE airport is specifically Pinellas County's, in terms of funding and oversight.

- Whit also added the board of county commissioners oversees the airport, so the airport is currently represented in this way, but this can be revisited as discussions of the regional MPO continue.
- Whit Blanton provided the following legislative updates (not an exhaustive list):
 - The Governor signed Bill 1301 into law. It puts restrictions on transit agencies in terms of advertising and the lane repurposing process. It also ultimately brings more funding to transportation.
 - In the budget the legislature has passed, but has not yet passed to the Governor, there are numerous earmarks (legislative appropriations) listed. These earmarks would come out of the state transportation trust fund. Thus, they will have direct impact on the five-year work program, because when these earmarks come in and are not vetoed by the Governor, they take priority over an MPO's prioritization list.
- The Forward Pinellas apportionment plan has been transmitted to the Governor's office. The interlocal agreement will be sent around to the local government partners shortly, in anticipation of the plan being signed.
- A position statement from the Campbell Park Neighborhood Association regarding I-175 was provided to the board.
- Public Comment:
 - David Ballard Geddis Jr. provided a critical comment about the automobile insurance industry.
 - Vice Mayor Mike Eisner from Tarpon Springs said he wants more LED lights in school zones to improve safety in dimly lit areas.

SUMMARY

The Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) is a two-year plan that identifies a metropolitan planning organization's (MPO) transportation planning activities and associated funding. State and federal transportation funding agencies provide guidance on required elements and timeframes for review and adoption of the UPWP, but the way the MPO allocates its funding for the various planning activities is at the discretion of the MPO.

Forward Pinellas developed a draft UPWP for July 1, 2024 – June 30, 2026 that was reviewed by the CAC at its February meeting and by the board in April. Forward Pinellas has also received comments from the state and federal agencies on that draft and has integrated those comments into the final UPWP included in the packet. The final UPWP is scheduled to be adopted by Forward Pinellas in May.

The UPWP includes introductory sections that discuss the MPO's functions and the planning priorities of the MPO, state and federal governments. This is followed by task pages and budget information that details staff support activities, consultant work and associated grant funding. Forward Pinellas staff will present the final UPWP and answer questions from committee members.

SUMMARY

As the US 19 corridor has transformed with the construction of grade-separated interchanges in recent decades, the mobility and land use impacts of these interchanges have been monitored closely. While travel times for vehicles traveling mainline US 19 have decreased with the implementation of interchanges, bicycle, pedestrian and transit rider access has decreased. In addition, there has been a shift in the land use patterns along the corridor, with businesses that depend on access and visibility to passing motorists being replaced by multifamily housing. Given those impacts, Forward Pinellas has been working with the Florida Department of Transportation to determine if the construction of interchanges north of Nebraska Avenue to the Pasco County line is the preferred improvement for the US 19 corridor.

A representative from FDOT will provide the committee with an overview of the different types of projects that could be considered for the corridor, along with an outline of the process for selecting a preferred alternative.

SUMMARY

Advantage Pinellas is the long-range transportation plan for the Forward Pinellas MPO. Last adopted in 2019 with a horizon year of 2045, agency staff has been working with local government partners to create a new plan with a horizon year of 2050. It is being developed in partnership with the Pinellas Suncoast Transit Authority's (PSTA) Community Bus Plan effort.

As the MPO for Pinellas County, Forward Pinellas is responsible for developing a 25 year long range transportation plan every five years to account for changes in transportation needs, land uses, shifting regional travel patterns, new and emerging technology, and demographic changes that have occurred since the last LRTP was adopted. Advantage Pinellas will provide a coordinated vision and strategy for aligning short-term and longer-term multimodal transportation investments to serve Pinellas County's economic, redevelopment and community goals.

Forward Pinellas staff has been continuing its public outreach activities throughout Pinellas County and has begun to develop the "Needs" portion of Advantage Pinellas, identifying all transportation projects necessary to meet the county's mobility needs through 2050. The committee received presentations on the active transportation and transit needs in recent months. Staff is developing the roadway Needs projects and will be presenting a draft of those projects to the committee for review and comment.






